Accreditation

The college's programs in art, art therapy, design, and transmedia are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD). In addition to NASAD accreditation, our environmental and interior design program is also accredited with the Council for Interior Design Accreditation (CIDA). The Setnor School of Music and its programs are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). Programs in the Department of Communication and Rhetorical Studies and the Department of Drama engage in regularly scheduled Self-Studies involving programmatic review and site visits by a panel of external reviewers from their respective disciplines.

Fees

All students matriculated in a VPA major or minor are charged a program fee that covers certain expenses such as applied music instruction, specialized studio art supplies, dramatic productions, visiting artists, and equipment and technology. Non-VPA students are charged an applied music fee for private instruction and a per credit fee for other VPA courses. Graduate Studies Information

Graduate students in the College of Visual and Performing Arts benefit from an effective combination of studio, performance, and research activities. Faculty advisors carefully establish the parameters of each graduate student's course of study and advance and facilitate interdisciplinary study. The aesthetic climate of the college supports and encourages the development of individual potential. In addition, the college recognizes the link between education, critical thinking, and cultural knowledge. Diversity and community are emphasized as important elements of every student's program design.

The college's graduate programs attract students of superior intellectual and creative ability from many distinguished institutions throughout the world. The faculty is composed of professional artists, designers, musicians, composers, actors, and scholars who are active and recognized in their fields. In addition, the college is committed to maintaining a regular influx of prominent visiting professionals.

Graduate Awards

Fellowships and Scholarships

Syracuse University provides University Graduate Fellowships on a competitive basis. These provide a competitive stipend for nine months of full-time study in addition to a tuition scholarship. See application materials for specific deadlines.

Assistantships

The College of Visual and Performing Arts may offer a teaching, technical, and/or administrative assistantship to qualified recipients, including first-year students. Assistantships offer valuable opportunities for students to enhance their professional credentials. Renewal of assistantships is based on superior performance in coursework and in assistantship assignments.

Tuition Scholarships

In addition to fellowships and assistantships, tuition scholarships in varying amounts are offered to outstanding students as evidenced by academic record and merit.

Scholarships

The college has a limited number of small scholarships to support graduate students. All scholarships are available to first-year students and are based on merit.

Graduate Good Standing Status

To be a graduate student in good standing, students must comply with the Graduate Grading Standards, which consider passing grades as A, A-, B+, B, B-, C+, C, and C-. The D grade is not an option for graduate students. The minimum GPA for graduate work is 2.8 in the first 30 credits. Certification for an advanced degree requires a minimum average of 3.0 for work comprising the program for the degree and a 2.8 average

for all credits earned. This information can be found in the Academic Rules and Regulations section of this catalog.

Specific programs in the College of Visual and Performing Arts can require the passing of additional reviews, examinations, and assessments of graduate work for a graduate student to be considered in good standing. Such reviews and assessments can result in continuation without reservations, continuation during a probationary period, or termination of student status. Students should consult their advisor for policies specific to their program or area.

Facilities

The College of Visual and Performing Arts provides an extensive array of facilities that support our academic programs, including:

ART - extensive studio facilities in the Comstock Art Building on south campus and the Shaffer Art Building and Smith Hall on main campus. These facilities are supported by wood and metal shops. At the Comstock location, we have five studio areas. The Art Education facility includes studio and classroom space. Our recently renovated Ceramics facility includes a state-of-the-art materials room, critique gallery, clay making room, mold/plaster room, dry and wet glaze labs, a resource room, throwing studio/classroom, sculpture studio/classroom, as well as indoor and outdoor kiln facilities (Blaauw, Geil, Anagama, and others). The Jewelry and Metalsmithing facility includes a well-equipped main studio with individual workstations, small machine and plating/anodizing rooms, plus casting, soldering, and finishing equipment. The Printmaking facility includes a 6,400 square foot studio space, housing a wide range of relief, intaglio, lithography, and letter presses, seriography/silkscreening capabilities, and hand papermaking equipment. Our Sculpture facility offers ample workspaces for assembly, project spaces dedicated to installation and performance, gallery spaces for student exhibitions, outdoor casting and large-scale fabrication capabilities, and semiprivate studio spaces for undergraduate students. Shaffer Art Building houses two studio programs. The Illustration facility includes studio and classroom spaces, while the Painting facility includes well-lighted studios with special skylights receiving north light, and a complete workshop. Finally, Smith Hall serves as the College's graduate and multidisciplinary hub as well and home to various functions of the Schools of Art and Design and Communication and Rhetorical Studies Department.

DESIGN - Our Design programs are housed in The Nancy Cantor Warehouse, Syracuse University's seven-floor building in downtown Syracuse. The Warehouse's open, industrial space was recently renovated to contain professional studio facilities for each design program; two shared computer labs; a printing lab; and Design Works, a fabrication lab. A student lounge, café, and gallery are conveniently located on the first floor.

FILM AND MEDIA ARTS - Facilities supporting the Department of Film and Media Arts are located in the lower level of Shaffer Art Building. Art Photography students have access to digital and analog facilities, including professional scanning and digital printing equipment, and can also utilize production facilities at Light Work (https://www.lightwork.org/) as well as our own studios and classrooms. The range of facilities ensures easy access to professional digital, analog, and lighting equipment, including large format ink-jet printers and a 44-inch color processor. Computer art facilities include a graduate studio, an advanced audio production and scanning studio, and a main computer lab. Art Video sports a multi-use, multi-format facility, in which production is executed with mini-DV camcorders, digital audio recorders, and necessary peripherals. Post-production suites are equipped with

Macintosh-based non-linear editing systems. Video projectors are available for presentations and exhibition. There are digital, multi-track audio studios, plus access to other Syracuse University facilities to complement production, post-production and exhibition activities. The Film Art production facilities include sync-sound camera/recorder packages: Aaton Super 16, Arriflex Super 16 and regular 16, CP16, non-sync Bolex cameras, SONY and PANASONIC DV and HDV video cameras; a broad array of location lighting and grip gear; Final Cut Pro non-linear editing stations equipped for HD editing; Steenback flatbed editors; a sound mix studio; an Oxberry animation studio; and a lighting studio.

MUSIC - The Setnor School of Music, located in Crouse College, is home to the acoustically rich, 700-seat Rose and Jules R. Setnor Auditorium, with its 3,823-pipe Holtkamp Organ. Approximately 200 recitals occur in this space each academic year. The school has classrooms and rehearsal spaces in Crouse College and Shaffer Art Building, as well as a recording studio in the Belfer Audio Archives.

COMMUNICATION and RHETORICAL STUDIES - located in recently renovated space in Sims Hall, the department's facilities include classrooms designed for video capture and replay of student speechmaking, along with multi-purpose room for hosting meetings and events.

Research Centers and Institutes

The College of Visual and Performing Arts supports and celebrates a culture of research. Both faculty and students across departments and programs engage in a variety of individual, group and cross-disciplinary initiatives that seek to expand human knowledge through creative analysis, innovation, and insight. These efforts are disseminated in a variety of ways including publishing, presentations, exhibitions and performances. The College's Office of Research and Graduate Studies facilitates both internal and external funding to support these efforts and the colleges' mission of providing an environment that thrives on critical thought and action.

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 372

Introductory etching and relief techniques, including: single- and multi-color woodcut, hard ground line etching, aquatint, scraping and burnishing, soft ground, drypoint, multi-color printing, editioning. Includes a history and contemporary uses of etching and relief printmaking. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 673 Digital Print Media (3 Credits)

 Δrt

Double-numbered with ARI 373

Experiment with developing digital printmaking methodologies and their contemporary applications to fine-art modes of hand-printmaking. Course content will be addressed via hands-on research projects, discussions and a series of Visiting Artists. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 674 Screenprinting (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 374

Introduction to the fundamentals and advanced techniques of screenprinting. Students will create limited-edition screenprints using hand-drawn and digital methods. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 675 Printmaking for Non-Art Majors (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 375

Introduction to the fundamentals and technical principles of printmaking methodologies. Explore traditional methods like copper etchings, hand-carved woodcuts, mono printing and a possibility for experimentation with other materials. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 676 Book Arts (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 475

Exploration of the artist book as method for creative expression. Students learn beginning and intermediate level binding methods with the goal of creating limited edition books which contain personally-created written and visual content. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 678 Advanced Print Media & Graphic Art (3 Credits)

Allows students full flexibility in printmaking techniques and content. Students develop their personal imagery based on well-conceived ideas and apply those ideas in the studio to produce technically and conceptually engaging work. Additional work for graduate students. ARI 682 Foundry: Casting and Moldmaking (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 382

Hands-on introduction to moldmaking techniques used to cast metals and other materials for artistic or industrial purposes. Moldmaking processes include plaster molds, investment molds, sand molds, and silicone molds. Materials to be cast include aluminum, plaster, and experimental materials. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 687 Figure Sculpture (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 387

Study and sculpt the human form using a variety of processes, techniques, and formats. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 690 Independent Study (1-6 Credits)

Exploration of a problem, or problems, in depth. Individual independent study upon a plan submitted by the student. Admission by consent of supervising instructor(s) and the department.

ARI 695 Archive as Art (3 Credits)

Double-numbered with ARI 495, AIC 495

Archive as contemporary art making strategy; conceptual/contextual process, form, and issues. Additional work for graduate level students.

ARI 701 Graduate Seminar 3: Graduate Thesis (6 Credits)

Art

This course will focus each student in their endeavor to compose a thesis paper prior to their creation of a body of thesis work creating the foundation for their future practice and career.

ARI 702 Graduate Seminar 4: Graduate Exhibition (6 Credits)

ATR 614 Materials and Techniques of Art Therapy Practice (3 Credits) Creative Arts Therapy

Understanding safety, psychological properties, ethical and cultural implications of art-making processes and materials selections. Design strategies for therapeutic use of art media, imagery and the creative process for facilitating therapy, relieving symptoms, promoting personal growth.

ATR 615 Social and Cultural Considerations in Art Therapy and Counseling (3 Credits)

Creative Arts Therapy

Cultural frameworks that affect relationships between individuals and among groups. Issues/trends in a culturally diverse society and implications for practice. Diversity factors including age, ethnicity, nationality, spirituality, gender, sexual orientation, mental/physical characteristics, and socioeconomic status.

ATR 616 Art Therapy Supervised Practicum/Internship I (3 Credits) Creative Arts Therapy

Observation and clinical practice of art therapy in regular consultation with a site supervisor and faculty supervisor. Overview of duties/roles, clinical skills, and use of supervision. Minimum of 335 hours on-site plus

ATR 617 Professional Orientation, Ethical and Legal Issues in Art Therapy and Counseling (3 Credits)

ATR 722 Art Therapy Internship Elective (1 Credit)

Creative Arts Therapy

Field placement at an existing internship site that is reflective of competencies and career goals. Work with clients under direction of a site supervisor and faculty supervisor. Maximum of 200 hours on-site, 80 are direct client contact.

ILL 650 Illustration Graduate Summer Intensive (3 Credits)

Art

This two week intensive will allow students to visit or host visits with NYC art directors, workspaces, museums and galleries, design firms and publishing houses. Special drawing and research assignments will be assigned throughout.

ILL 660 Illustration Research Problems (1-18 Credits)

ILL 661 Illustration Graduate Studio I (3 Credits)

Art

This course will focus on fostering creative ideas and a general understanding of contemporary illustration while exploring a variety of media and materials that are used in the field.

ILL 662 Illustration Graduate Studio II (3 Credits)

Art

The goal of this class is to build on the objectives learned in ILL 661 Illustration Graduate Studio I. The course will function more independently with students creating, researching and making a hardbound book of a collection of their drawings or visual narrative stories.

Prereq: ILL 661

ILL 663 New Directions in Illustration (3 Credits)

Art

This class analyzes primitive, native, and outsider art and their utilization in contemporary illustration. Students will explore new artistic directions in their own work, moving from classic European figurative-based photographic works to the more Expressionistic works of artists like Picasso, Matisse, and Duchamp.

ILL 664 Licensing from Studio to Market (3 Credits)

Art

A class for the entrepreneurial artist to develop creative products for commercial markets that can be disseminated via licensing. Students will take their ideas from concept to fabrication while learning about the licensing world.

ILL 665 Illustration Grad Workshop (3 Credits)

Art

This advanced workshop focuses on defining a professional orientation in the practice of illustration and visual narratives. There will be a strong emphasis on storytelling techniques widely used in modern visual development for film, video games, storyboards, graphic novels and picture books.

Advisory recommendation Prereq: ILL 662

ILL 667 Illustration Practice (3 Credits)

 Δrt

This course is an exploration of the tools used in communicating visual ideas. Assignments and projects will integrate design, illustration, typography and branding, using digital, analog and emerging technologies.

ILL 669 Drawing on Location (3 Credits)

Art

This course consists of three components: Weekly sketchbook drawings at various locations, a narrative series of drawings that journal a place, person, or thing, and the reinterpretation of a historical landmark with a modern approach.

ILL 670 Experience Credit (1-6 Credits)

Art

Participation in a discipline or subject related experience. Student must be evaluated by written or oral reports or an examination. Permission in advance with the consent of the department chairperson, instructor, and dean. Limited to those in good academic standing.

Repeatable

ILL 671 Creative Strategy (3 Credits)

Art

This is a seminar class for graduate students and will focus on exploring research strategies including the collection, interpretation, and presentation of visual information. Students will read selected writings by creatives on a weekly basis, contribute to class discussions, and examine their own research strategies.

ILL 672 Visual Voice I (3 Credits)

Art

This course focuses on defining a professional orientation in the practice of visual narratives and storytelling. There will be a strong emphasis on finding each individual artistic practice and visual voice.

Advisory recommendation Prereq: ILL 671

ILL 673 Story Lab (3 Credits)

Art

This course explores narrative formulas common within movies, tv, video games, graphic novels, and children's books. By reading and analyzing works of literature students will delve into why such work produces powerful emotional connections. In addition to reading books students will create their own narratives.

ILL 674 Play Matters (3 Credits)

Art

This class will not only encourage, but demand exploration and experimentation. Students will step out of their comfort zones and play seriously with a range of media and processes, seeking new forms of expression.

ILL 675 Visual Voice II (3 Credits)

Art

This course focuses on advancing the professional orientation in the practice of visual narratives and storytelling. There will be a strong emphasis on finding the artistic practice and visual voice in the community and the world.

ILL 676 Entrepreneur (3 Credits)

ILL 677 Visual Integration (3 Credits)

Art

This advanced workshop focuses on defining a professional orientation in the practice of illustration and visual narratives. There will be a strong emphasis on the integration of visual and verbal modes of communication widely used in contemporary visual development for graphic novels, picture books, storyboards, film, and video games. Advisory recommendation Prereq: ILL 671 and ILL 672

ILL 690 Independent Study (1-6 Credits)

Art

Exploration of a problem, or problems, in depth. Individual independent study upon a plan submitted by the student. Admission by consent of supervising instructor(s) and the department.

Repeatable

ILL 760 Illustration Communication (1-12 Credits)

Art

Historical and contemporary aspects of illustration as they relate to the communication process.

Advisory recommendation Prereq: ILL 660

ILL 761 Printmaking for Illustration I (3 Credits)

Art

This course will introduce printmaking procedures, including monotype, drypoint, linoleum cut and silkscreening, that can be done without investing in major printmaking equipment.

This class focuses on thesis topic choice, research, and writing. The written thesis is grounded in research with a direct correlation to the topic of the visual thesis. The thesis subject will be formulated in anticipation of professional outcomes.

ILL 764 MFA Thesis II (6 Credits)

Art

Students will create a cohesive series of artworks based on their chosen thesis topic. The form of the visual thesis will be reflective of the students; chosen professional direction, using appropriately targeted media, style, and topical focus. The visual thesis will be created for exhibition. The written thesis will be finalized.

DES 624 Creative Problem Solving (3 Credits)

Design

Double-numbered with DES 324

Creative problem solving enhances knowledge concerning creativity, increases creative ability, and fosters problem-solving skills that are essential across disciplines. DES 631 Art Nouveau Design and Architecture: Studies in Material Culture (3 Credits)

Introduction to the historical and social context that gave rise to Art Nouveau, its various manifestations, and the important practitioners and promoters of this movement in Europe and the United States.

DES 635 App Design and Prototyping (3 Credits)

Design

Double-numbered with DES 335

Planning, Design, and Digital prototyping of mobile devices (smart phones, tablets, watches) for multiple operating systems. User experience (UX) and User Interface (UI) best practices. Wireframes, flow mapping, and user testing for mobile operating systems. Additional work required for graduate students.

DES 650 Adaptive Design (3 Credits)

Design

Double-numbered with DES 450

Adaptive Design focuses on the creative relationships between people with disabilities, clinicians, and designers. This course centers on dialogue, interviewing, collaborative teaming, and co-design, creating custom solutions to meet specific needs for those in the disabled community. Additional work required for graduate students.

DES 652 Branding and Marketing Works (3 Credits)

Design

Double-numbered with DES 452

Interdisciplinary design studio focused on branding and marketing. Additional work required of graduate students.

DES 663 Design Innovation and Ideation (3 Credits)

Design

Double-numbered with DES 363

Design Innovation using non-linear and iterative processes. Uncover and iteratively address user needs, challenge assumptions, redefine problems. Value creation with a bias toward action to address both wicked and tame problems in industry and society. Identification and exploration of possibilities over problems as a path forward. Additional work required for graduate students.

DES 996 Final Presentation (3 Credits)

Design

Final presentation accompanied by written statement, culminating in oral examination for M.F.A. degree. Taken during final semester upon advisor's approval.

Design

Business organizations, design management and planning. Relations with clients, office organization and management; proposals and contracts, estimating, and elementary accounting. Protection of designs, patents, copyrights, and trademarks.

IND 580 International Course (1-12 Credits)

Design

Offered through SUAbroad by educational institution outside the United States. Student registers for the course at the foreign institution and is graded according to that institution's practice. SUAbroad works with the S.U. academic department to assign the appropriate course level, title, and grade for the student's transcript.

MUS 504 Administrative Challenge and Change in Museums (3 Credits)

Design

Overview of important theoretical and practical challenges facing curators of history and anthropology, using theoretically grounded and case-study based readings. Students also have the opportunity for handson experience with collections through a final exhibition project. MUS 507 Digital Collections Management & Preservation (3 Credits) Design

MUS 602 Digital Tools for Museums (3 Credits)

Design

Introduces fundamental applications used in museums and collections through the management of archival digital assets; production of exhibition graphics, printed collateral, promotional material; and digital modeling. Field related best practices, compliance and industry standards.

MUS 603 Practicum I Graduate Seminar in Museum Studies (1.5 Credits)

Design

The Practicum I Graduate Seminar will explore themes of professional practice, academic standards, general best practice, and current trends and topics in the museum and cultural heritage field. Guest speakers and student presentations will introduce contemporary issues and facilitate dialogue about contemporary museum practice.

MUS 604 Practicum II Graduate Seminar in Museum Studies (1.5 Credits)

Design
