

PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS (PAI)

PAI 300 Selected Topics (1-6 Credits)

Maxwell

Exploration of a topic (to be determined) not covered by the standard curriculum but of interest to faculty and students in a particular semester. Repeatable

PAI 305 Policy Implementation (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Course focuses upon how public policy is put into action, with a focus on developing knowledge and skills essential for addressing some of society's most complex problems.

PAI 308 Mental Health Policy (3 Credits)

Maxwell

The course provides an overview of contemporary issues related to mental and behavioral health conditions, addresses challenges related to mental health policies in the United States, and explores policy reforms and intervention strategies.

PAI 310 Education Policy (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Course familiarizes students with the policies defining the K-12 U.S. education system.

PAI 320 Economics for Policy Analysis (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Economic modeling and analysis of decision-making by individuals and firms. Particular emphasis is placed on long-term decisions, decision-making under uncertainty, and cost-benefit analysis, and on the development of professional-grade quantitative analysis, writing, and presentation skills.

PAI 338 U.S. Intelligence Community: Governance & Practice, 1947-Present (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Cross-listed with IRP 338

Course focuses on the practice, structure and governance of the U.S. intelligence community.

PAI 400 Selected Topics (1-6 Credits)

Exploration of a topic (to be determined) not covered by the standard curriculum but of interest to faculty and students in a particular semester. Repeatable 6 times for 6 credits maximum

PAI 415 Poverty Policy (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Course examines the nature and extent of poverty in the U.S., its causes and consequences, and the antipoverty effects of existing and proposed government programs and policies.

PAI 429 Criminal State: Understanding North Korea's Evolving Illicit Activities (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Double-numbered with PAI 729

This course explores how North Korea has evolved into a "mafia state," engaging in illicit activities to circumvent international sanctions to fund its national security priorities. Students will learn about the challenges faced by international governments to stop Pyongyang from raising funds to fund its ballistic and nuclear programs. Additional work required of graduate students.

PAI 485 Follow the Money: Key Issues in Illicit Finance (3 Credits)

Maxwell

Double-numbered with PAI 685

This course examines how criminals evade the global framework of money laundering regulations and laws to exploit the financial industry. Students will discuss government policies that enable public and private stakeholders to identify, assess, and combat financial crime threats more effectively. Additional work for graduate students.

PAI 500 Selected Topics (1-6 Credits)

Exploration of a topic (to be determined) not covered by the standard curriculum but of interest to faculty and students in a particular semester. Repeatable

PAI 580 International Course (1-12 Credits)

Maxwell

Offered through SUAbroad by educational institution outside the United States. Student registers for the course at the foreign institution and is graded according to that institution's practice. SUAbroad works with the S.U. academic department to assign the appropriate course level, title, and grade for the student's transcript.
