The College of Visual and Performing Arts is dedicated to nurturing the creative and scholarly abilities of its students. The college, which is at the center of the University's cultural life, is organized into six areas:

Recognizing the link between education, understanding, and cultural knowledge, the College of Visual and Performing Arts is also committed to providing sites for learning about diversity throughout its curricula.

Accreditation

The college's programs in art, design, and film and media arts are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD). In addition to NASAD accreditation, our environmental and interior design program is also accredited with the Council for Interior Design Accreditation (CIDA). The Setnor School of Music and its programs are accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM). Programs in the Department of Communication and Rhetorical Studies and the Department of Drama engage in regularly scheduled Self-Studies involving programmatic review and site visits by a panel of external reviewers from their respective disciplines.

Shared Competencies

The College of Visual and Performing Arts participates in students' knowledge and skill development through the Shared Competencies (http://effectiveness.syr.edu/shared-competencies/), Syracuse University's institutional learning goals that highlight the knowledge and skills students can expect to gain through their major courses, liberal arts requirements and co-curricular activities.

Educational Mission

The College of Visual and Performing Arts is committed to the education of cultural leaders who will engage and inspire audiences through performance, visual art, design, scholarship, and commentary. The college provides the tools for self-discovery and risk-taking in an environment that thrives on critical thought and action.

Intra-University Transfer

Students interested in transferring into VPA must attend an IUT informational session in order to understand the process and obtain the application materials. These sessions are held throughout the semester. Minimum requirements include a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better, and a completed application form. Some programs require an audition, portfolio review, or a questionnaire. Please contact the VPA Office of Academic and Career Advising, 200 Crouse College, for additional information. Application deadlines vary by program; admission for all programs is on a space-available basis.

PED General Electives

Up to 6 credits in any combination of physical education (PED) or dance appreciation (DAP) courses numbered 100 to 299 may be included among academic elective credits toward a degree in the college for singly enrolled students. If the minor in Dance Appreciation is declared, the 6 credit cap is waived given the structure of the program.

Transfer Credit

Transfer of credit is considered only for courses that may be applied to the program in which the student is interested. In the School of Art (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performingarts/art/), School of Design (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/ undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/design/), Department of Drama (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visualperforming-arts/drama/), Department of Film and Media Arts (https:// coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performingarts/film-media-arts/), and the Setnor School of Music (https:// coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/ setnor-music/), transfer students often have an excess of credits in academic subjects that cannot be applied to a specific program due to the high number of studio credits required. The result may be that the period of undergraduate study is extended beyond the typical four years. In the Setnor School of Music (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/ undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/setnor-music/), placement examinations in music theory and applied music are also required before credit is accepted.

In all cases, transfer credit is evaluated after admission specifically for the degree program to which the student is admitted and may change if the student moves into a different program. Credits - not grades or honor points - are transferred from other institutions. Only credits earned at Syracuse University are counted in the grade point average. If the student subsequently takes a course at SU for which he/she had previously received transfer credit, the transfer credit will be removed, as courses completed at SU take precedent. This includes credits transferred for academic or studio electives.

Fees

All students matriculated in a VPA major or minor are charged a program fee each semester that covers certain expenses such as applied music instruction, specialized studio art supplies, dramatic productions, visiting artists, and equipment and technology. Non-VPA students are charged an applied music fee for private instruction and a per credit fee for other VPA

The First-Year Experience

All first-year students are assigned faculty advisors to help them plan their programs. In all six areas of the college, first-year courses and programs address the adjustment and integration of first-year students into college life. In each area, the emphasis is on small class size, one-to-one contact with faculty, the development of skills, and the personal appropriateness of each student's choice of professional pursuit.

The School of Art (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/art/) offers an exciting, energetic culture of students who are encouraged to cross-conventional boundaries with their work. The first-year experience includes both required and elective academic options.

The School of Design (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/design/) first-year experience provides a focused design studio-based education, critical to the development of a solid understanding of the fundamental elements of the design disciplines. Students learn basic visualization and making skills, as well as an ability to apply iterative thought and action processes to a given problem. In addition, students receive a focused introduction to the ethical and philosophical grounding of the various design professions.

In the Department of Film and Media Arts (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/film-media-arts/), the first-year student experience is designed to introduce students to studio practice, history, and theory of media, with an emphasis on the interconnectedness of all four areas of transmedia. The Transmedia Colloquium brings to campus a wide array of contemporary artists working with photography, film, video, computer art and animation. First year students take a sequence of studio classes that build up a basic set of competencies for editing still and moving images, sound and animation. Together, these classes work toward developing the necessary conceptual and practical skills to maintain a creative edge in a rapidly changing world of art and commerce.

In the Department of Communication and Rhetorical Studies (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/communication-rhetorical-studies/), first-year students are part of a comprehensive introductory program led by faculty and staff, incorporating a lecture series, information meetings, alumni panels, and advising. The entire first-year class takes two courses that involve small discussion groups of approximately 20 students. In the courses, students meet with faculty and teaching assistants to address issues of concern in their discipline.

In the Department of Drama (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/drama/), student involvement in theatrical activity is immediate. During the first year students participate in the department's foundation program. Each week drama faculty and students gather for Wednesday Lab, which includes presentations of scenes from class, guest artists, talks with alumni, and other panel discussions.

In the Setnor School of Music (https://coursecatalog.syracuse.edu/ undergraduate/visual-performing-arts/setnor-music/), a weekly student convocation brings the entire school community together for performances by their peers, faculty, and many guest artists. In addition to many hours of individual practice, the school encourages the development of skills needed for functioning in group situations. Thus, students are required to be involved in one of the school's large ensemble groups each semester.

Study Abroad

The College of Visual and Performing Arts recognizes the immense value that study abroad opportunities add to our students' educational experiences, and we strongly encourage all students to begin the exploration of one or more potential study abroad experiences from day one of their Syracuse University experience. A good place to start is to have conversations with your academic advisor and to visit the Syracuse Abroad website at http://suabroad.syr.edu/, or schedule an appointment to meet with an Syracuse Abroad advisor. Our college offers specific study abroad semester programs in Florence, London, Strasbourg and Prague. Summer programs include Berlin, Bologna, Florence, and Venice. Short-term spring break programs include Brazil and Spain. Funding opportunities include the undergraduate Dean's Award for International Education.

Facilities

The College of Visual and Performing Arts provides an extensive array of facilities that support our academic programs, including:

ART - extensive studio facilities in the Comstock Art Building on south campus and the Shaffer Art Building and Smith Hall on main campus. These facilities are supported by wood and metal shops. At the Comstock location, we have five studio areas. The Art Education facility includes studio and classroom space. Our recently renovated Ceramics facility includes a state-of-the-art materials room, critique gallery, clay making room, mold/plaster room, dry and wet glaze labs, a resource room, throwing studio/classroom, sculpture studio/classroom, as well as indoor and outdoor kiln facilities (Blaauw, Geil, Anagama, and others). The Jewelry and Metalsmithing facility includes a well-equipped main studio with individual work stations, small machine and plating/anodizing rooms, plus casting, soldering, and finishing equipment. The Printmaking facility includes a 6,400 square foot studio space, housing a wide range of relief, intaglio, lithography, and letter presses, serigraphy/silks-creening capabilities, and hand papermaking equipment. Our Sculpture facility offers ample workspaces for assembly, project spaces dedicated to installation and performance, gallery spaces for student exhibitions, outdoor casting and large-scale fabrication capabilities, and semiprivate studio spaces for undergraduate students. Shaffer Art Building houses two studio programs. The Illustration facility includes studio and classroom spaces, while the Painting facility includes well-lighted studios with special skylights receiving north light, and a complete workshop. Finally, Smith Hall serves as the College's graduate and multidisciplinary hub as well and home to various functions of the Schools of Art and Design and Communication and Rhetorical Studies Department.

DESIGN - Our Design programs are housed in The Nancy Cantor Warehouse, Syracuse University's seven-floor building in downtown Syracuse. The Warehouse's open, industrial space was recently renovated to contain professional studio facilities for each design program; a shared computer lab; a printing lab; and Design Works, a fabrication lab. A student lounge, café, and gallery are conveniently located on the first floor.

FILM AND MEDIA ARTS - Facilities supporting the Department of Film and Media Arts are located in the lower level of Shaffer Art Building. Art Photography students have access to professional scanning and digital printing equipment which include the world-class production facilities at Light Work (http://www.lightwork.org/) as well as fully equipped

lighting studios and a wide array of high end digital and analog cameras for student use. Computer Art and Animation facilities include a main computer lab, an advanced audio production and recording studio, a green screen room, digital and traditional object fabrication facilities, and VR equipment. Art Video sports a multi-use, multi-format facility, in which production is executed with digital film camcorders, digital audio recorders, and necessary peripherals. Post-production suites are equipped with Macintosh-based non-linear editing systems equipped with the Adobe Creative Cloud, Da Vinci Resolve 14, and our color grading stations have Flanders Scientific Professional broadcast monitors. Video projectors are available for presentations and exhibition. There are digital, multi-track audio studios, plus access to other Syracuse University facilities to complement production, post-production and exhibition activities. The Film production facilities include 4K Hi-end digital film cameras such as the Canon C500 and Sony F3 with Odyssey 7Q+ recorders 4K RAW enabled; Blackmagic Design 4K production cameras; Blackmagic Pocket Cinema Cameras with Metabones Speed boosters; High quality Zeiss film lenses; and a large array of Canon PL lenses. We also offer students the possibility of shooting 16mm and Super 16mm with our Aaton XTR Production camera as well as Arri SR1, CP16, and Bolex cameras. We have a large range of location lighting and grip gear such as the Arri M18 HMI, Arri Compact HMI Fresnel 1.2K, 4x4 Kino-Flo Banks, Kino-Flo Diva Lite, Joker-Bug 800W HMI and a large variety of LED lighting. In addition we have a lighting studio with a green screen and a cinematography room that can be configured for studio based productions.

DRAMA - The Regent Theatre Complex, which houses the Department of Drama and Syracuse Stage, contains three theaters and a cabaret space. These four performance spaces provide the broadest range of design and staging possibilities, from conventional proscenium to theater-inthe-round. Included in the complex are The John D. Archbold Theatre, a 499-seat proscenium theater; The Arthur Storch Theatre, seating up to 250 people, can be configured as a proscenium, thrust, or avenue stage; The Loft Theatre is an intimate and flexible space that seats 65 audience members in a variety of configurations, but is most often used for short plays, readings, workshops and experimental efforts; The Sutton Pavilion provides a versatile cabaret space, often for late-night entertainment for Syracuse University and the greater Syracuse communities. The complex also includes dance studios, performance/rehearsal studios, lecture rooms, seminar rooms, musical practice rooms, locker rooms, and showers - as well as the professionally staffed technical shops that build the Syracuse Stage and Department of Drama productions. Facilities adjacent to the complex provide theater design and technology studios, classrooms, and CAD lab.

MUSIC - The Setnor School of Music, located in Crouse College, is home to the acoustically rich, 700-seat Rose and Jules R. Setnor Auditorium, with its 3,823-pipe Holtkamp Organ. Approximately 200 recitals occur in this space each academic year. The school has classrooms and rehearsal spaces in Crouse College and Shaffer Art Building, as well as a recording studio in the Belfer Audio Archives.

COMMUNICATION and RHETORICAL STUDIES - located in recently renovated space in Sims Hall, the department's facilities include classrooms designed for video capture and replay of student speechmaking, along with multi-purpose room for hosting meetings and events.

All VPA programs are supported by wood and metal shops which are located in the Warehouse, Comstock Art Facility, and Smith Hall.

Research Centers and Institutes

The College of Visual and Performing Arts supports and celebrates a culture of research. Both faculty and students across departments and programs engage in a variety of individual, group and cross-disciplinary initiatives that seek to expand human knowledge through creative analysis, innovation, and insight. These efforts are disseminated in a variety of ways including publishing, presentations, exhibitions and performances. The College's Office of Research and Graduate Studies facilitates both internal and external funding to support these efforts and the colleges' mission of providing an environment that thrives on critical thought and action.

University Requirements

In addition to FYS 101 First Year Seminar, the B.A., B.F.A., B.I.D., BMus, and B.S. Degrees require completion of an IDEA course (chosen from a select list). The IDEA course requirement may be fulfilled by a Liberal Arts Course, Elective Credit, or Major Credit depending on the course taken and the student's program of study. AMC 527 Organ Improvisation (1 Credit)

Gain confidence and facility improvising at the organ in a variety of forms and styles. Weekly introduction to a new technique and a step-by-step process for students to create improvisation using that technique. Repeatable 2 times for 2 credits maximum

AMC 528 Figured Bass Accompaniment (1-2 Credits)

Music

Learning how to accompany baroque chamber music from figured bass symbols. Aspects of musical style and performance practice will be discussed. This course is taught on the harpsichord

Prereq: MTC 145 and 146

AMC 529 Service Playing (1-2 Credits)

Music

Basic skills needed to be a successful church musician. Focus on hymn and service music playing, psalm and chant accompaniment, anthem accompaniment, conducting from the console, registration practice, worship planning, and tips for finding local employment or substitute work as a church musician.

AMC 531 Orchestral Audition Prep I (1 Credit)

Music

Preparation of standard orchestral audition repertoire and protocol for a professional audition.

AMC 532 Orchestral Audition Prep II (1 Credit)

AMC 540 Opera Workshop (0-1 Credits)

Primarily for students in voice. Experience in conducting, coaching, accompanying, acting, directing, and stage management in the preparation and presentation of operas. Scenes from various operas and one full-length opera.

Music

Music

Exploration of conceptual and experiential knowledge that benefits the practice and performance of music and theater. Students will apply conscious thinking to improve movement and performance skills without strain, stress, or pain.

Repeatable 8 times for 16 credits maximum

ARI 221 Ceramics Hand-building (3 Credits)

Introduces and familiarizes the student with basic methods of preparing and forming clay using pinch, coil and slab construction techniques. Includes basic methods of decorating, glazing and firing ceramic objects. Explores sculptural and functional art works.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 223 Ceramics Wheel-throwing (3 Credits)

Art

Introduction to the potter's wheel as a tool for creating form and surface with clay. Introduction to contemporary and historical artworks that make use of the wheel.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 225 Ceramics Slip-casting and Mold-making (3 Credits)

Art

Introduction to 3D forms using mold-making and slip-casting techniques, art and industrial design histories in ceramics that make use of the casting method, glazing and other surface treatments of the slip-cast object.

ARI 227 Ceramics and the Digital Image (3 Credits)

Art

This course will introduce students to experimental and investigative ceramic decal techniques and processes to increase skills and knowledge in the areas of ceramics and print. Decals will be designed, found, appropriated, and assembled by students. These will be printed with the 4-color CMYK decal printer and the HP laser printer.

ARI 231 Drawing I Observation (3 Credits)

Art

The focus of this course is to learn to see and allow the experience to develop into drawing.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 232 Drawing through the Figure (3 Credits)

Art

The objectives of this drawing course are to perceive and understand the human figure in terms of proportion, structure, motion, surface and volumes.

ARI 233 Drawing Nature (3 Credits)

Art

Develop drawing skills and processes through the observation of natural subjects.

ARI 243 Introduction to Jewelry and Metals (3 Credits)

Art

Fundamental techniques and visual design problems as introduction to working with metal, cutting, soldering, forging, finishing, and other surface treatments.

ARI 244 Casting (3 Credits)

Art

Basic casting methods used by the studio jeweler and metalsmith. Includes wax modeling and lost wax, cuttlefish bone, and other casting methods.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 261 Painting Studio I (3 Credits)

Art

Figurative and nonfigurative painting in oils or acrylics as the basis for study of color and form. Materials and approaches.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 270 Experience Credit (1-6 Credits)

Art

ARI 321 Ceramics Construction and Firing Techniques (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 621

Open to all. Students may pursue their own artistic direction with ceramic medium. They may hand build, throw on the wheel, use slip casting techniques to create their art work, or do their own research with kilns and glazes. Additional work for graduate students.

Repeatable 4 times for 12 credits maximum

ARI 328 Clay & Glaze Technology (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 628

Introduction to ceramic raw materials, material safety, clay and glaze calculation, ceramic studio design, refractories and kiln design, and history of ceramics as it pertains to the advancement of ceramic technology.

Prereq: ARI 221 and ARI 223

ARI 330 Advanced Drawing (3 Credits)

Art

Work from observation of volume and space and extend that into drawing invented forms and space. How light creates form, space and atmosphere, how light can create illusionistic worlds and things in that world.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

Prereq: ARI 231

ARI 331 Eye Hand Body Mind through Drawing (3 Credits)

Art

Integrate traditional and contemporary approaches, materials, and processes in drawing with mindfulness-based contemplative practices. Structured and open problems will challenge and enrich students¿ ability to perceive, create, and think with whole body-mind awareness.

ARI 332 Drawing Off Paper (3 Credits)

Art

Contemporary approaches to drawing. Introduce and encourage students to seek and consider ways of marking time, form, space, and image utilizing traditional and non-traditional materials and non-paper surfaces and spaces.

Prereq: ARI 231

ARI 333 Drawing II:Representation to Conceptualization (3 Credits)

Art

This class builds on skills developed and explored in Drawing I:Observation. Course problems will work from observation of volume and space and extend that into drawing invented forms and space.

Repeatable 3 times for 9 credits maximum

Prereq: ARI 231

ARI 334 Narrative Drawing (3 Credits)

Art

The creation of visuals that support visual storytelling, such as comics, graphic novels, comic strips and picture books.

ARI 341 Narrative Jewelry and Metalwork (3 Credits)

Art

Investigates how personal or public stories, fiction or nonfiction, may be transmitted through objects that are constructed of metal.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 342 Transformation in Jewelry & Metalwork (3 Credits)

Art

The transformation of materials and objects into new objects that change the meaning of the original is the focus of this course.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 345 Stones and Stonesetting (3 Credits)

Art

Introduction to gemology as it pertains to jewelry and metalsmithing. Intermediate and advanced level stone settings.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 346 Surface Techniques and Processes (3 Credits)

Δri

Surface techniques and processes used to enhance objects made for human use and adornment. This course builds on the fabrication and casting techniques learned in the introductory level courses.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 347 Color on Metal (3 Credits)

Δrt

Jewelry and metalsmithing techniques and processes used to color the surface of non-ferrous metal objects.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 348 Metal Forming (3 Credits)

Art

Jewelry and object design and making, using metal forming techniques and processes. Objects may include vessel forms, containers and small sculptures.

Prereq: ARI 243

ARI 361 Painting Studio II (3 Credits)

Art

Continued studio development of ideas objects, self-critical attitude, and approach to painting.

Repeatable 4 times for 12 credits maximum

Prereq: ARI 261

ARI 371 Planographic Processes (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 671

Focus in planographic (smooth matrix) printmaking methodologies. Planographic Processes: Lithography, Monoprint and Monotype. Printmaking history and its contemporary uses will be addressed in discussions, research assignments and a series of Visiting Artists. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 372 Etching and Relief (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 672

Introductory etching and relief techniques, including: single- and multi-color woodcut, hard ground line etching, aquatint, scraping and burnishing, soft ground, drypoint, multi-color printing, editioning. Includes a history and contemporary uses of etching and relief printmaking. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 373 Digital Print Media (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 673

Experiment with developing digital printmaking methodologies and their contemporary applications to fine-art modes of hand-printmaking. Course content will be addressed via hands-on research projects, discussions and a series of Visiting Artists. Additional work for graduate students. Prereq: Any ARI or ARL Course

ARI 374 Screenprinting (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 674

Introduction to the fundamentals and advanced techniques of screenprinting. Students will create limited-edition screenprints using hand-drawn and digital methods. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 375 Printmaking for Non-Art Majors (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 675

Introduction to the fundamentals and technical principles of printmaking methodologies. Explore traditional methods like copper etchings, hand-carved woodcuts, mono printing and a possibility for experimentation with other materials. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 380 International Course (1-12 Credits)

Art

Offered through SUAbroad by educational institution outside the United States. Student registers for the course at the foreign institution and is graded according to that institution's practice. SUAbroad works with the S.U. academic department to assign the appropriate course level, title, and grade for the student's transcript.

Repeatable

ARI 381 Advanced Sculpture (3 Credits)

Art

Cross-listed with ARI 481

In this course, students will examine the theory and studio practice of contemporary sculpture through individual creative works.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 382 Foundry: Casting and Moldmaking (3 Credits)

Art

Double-numbered with ARI 682

Hands-on introduction to moldmaking techniques used to cast metals and other materials for artistic or industrial purposes. Moldmaking processes include plaster molds, investment molds, sand molds, and silicone molds. Materials to be cast include aluminum, plaster, and experimental materials. Additional work for graduate students.

ARI 383 Wood and Mixed-Media Research (3 Credits)

Art

This course will focus on using wood and mixed media as art-making materials. Students will learn several woodworking techniques as well as the hand and power tools and machinery necessary to perform them. Repeatable 3 times for 9 credits maximum

ARI 384 Functional Sculpture (3 Credits)

Art

Studio course to design and make highly original objects that interact in some way with human beings. To ensure that these objects have the utmost degree of visual and physical presence.

Repeatable 2 times for 6 credits maximum

ARI 385 Installation Seminar (3 Credits)

Art

Explores the theory and practice of Installation based art works. Students will learn the history of this contemporary art medium and explore its potential by creating installation art works.

ARI 386 Digital Sculpture (3 Credits)

Art

Exploration of the integration of digital processes into a sculptural workflow. ARL 274 Gig Posters (1 Credit)

Art

Various techniques utilized to create gig posters, including: screenprint, broadside letterpress, and copy machine/scanner collage. Those methodologies and their uses, history, and cultural context are discovered through studying examples, discussions and hands-on experimentation.

ARL 275 Print Media & Graphic Art (1 Credit)

CRS 545 Issues in Argumentation (3 Credits)

Computer Art

CAR 101 Introduction to 3D Animation (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

The first course in this three course series focuses on concepts, aesthetics, and practice of 3D animation and visual effects. This course is an introduction to modeling, texturing, digital-sculpting and shading.

CAR 102 Art and Craft of Animation (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

Introductory studio course explores animation history and practice, with a strong emphasis on practice. Students will learn important animation techniques and modalities and build a foundation for further coursework or personal exploration of animation.

CAR 111 Introduction to Programming for Visual Art (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

An introductory course that combines the programming/scripting of digital art projects with thinking about software, interactive digital art, and digital culture.

CAR 131 Introduction to Multimedia (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

The fundamentals for making art with computers in consideration of time and interactivity. The fundamentals of using programming and software applications for multimedia and the internet.

CAR 200 Selected Topics (1-6 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

Exploration of a topic (to be determined) not covered by the standard curriculum but of interest to faculty and students in a particular semester. Repeatable

CAR 201 Intermediate 3D Animation (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

The second course in this three course series focuses on concepts, aesthetics, and practice of 3D animation and visual effects. This course will be an introduction to keyframe, procedural and character animation. Prereq: CAR 101

CAR 211 Introduction to Electronics and electronic Object Making for Art (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

An introductory level physical computing class. The course covers electrical and mechanical engineering techniques for the purpose of art and cultural production.

CAR 230 Topics in Computer Gaming I (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

Exploring computer gaming topics assigned at the outset of the semester. Topics may include mobile gaming, pervasive gaming, self-made alternative game controllers for existing games, or 3D gaming.

CAR 233 2D Computer Gaming (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

Introduction to various software techniques and programming concepts that are central to creating computer games in 2D environments. Experimental practices and critical theory associated with this field will supplement the practical lessons.

CAR 240 Multimedia Programming (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

Techniques for creating procedural, data-driven, and interactive visuals, as well as cultural issues regarding the nature of online communication. May not be repeated for credit.

Prereq: CAR 111

CAR 241 Audio Production and Recording I (3 Credits)

Film and Media Arts

The course will focus on digital audio production in the media arts. Emphasis on the relationship between sound and image. Topics include studio recording, field recording, microphone and mixing techniques. This course focuses on the implementation of various concepts in digital production and provides students with advanced techniques in 3D animation.
